




Current Status in Lebanon



In general, MRE targets the "unaware", the "unknowledgeable", the "misinformed", the "reckless", and the "compelled". MRE shall be tailored to suit the different categories as well as the varying demographic factors, such as the gender and age compositions of the target group(s). Thus, depending on the demographics of the target group, different MRE tools shall be used to communicate MRE messages, including:

- Lectures and presentations
- Short Message Service (SMS)
- Social Media Messages
- Flyers and posters
- Short articles and stories
- Mass media messages
- Messages transmitted through non-traditional venues



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Irrespective of the tool or channel, any message transmitted shall be pre-tested for clarity, impact, and suitability to ensure the avoidance of misleading and confusing messages.

IAs and members of the MRE Steering Committee who wish to transmit MRE messages shall ensure that the messages have prior approval from the LMAC.



MRE in Lebanon is conducted under the supervision of and in coordination/partnership with LMAC by:

trained activists from the National MRE Steering Committee that is affiliated to LMAC, (NGOs working in local communities, and in private schools;

> trained health educators in the public schools of Lebanon.

Trainings are executed following a national MRE Curriculum developed by the University of Balamand, funded by UNICEF, and approved by LMAC according to the NMAS.



In the near future, LMAC shall start accrediting all MRE activists in Lebanon in compliance with NMAS, and specifically NMAS 08.10


Note that Gender is one of the cross cutting issues at LMAC.

MRE in Lebanon is based on:


✓ Needs assessments & KAP (knowledge, attitude, and practice) surveys undertaken in partnership with the affected and/or targeted communities to inform messages and methods.

Then,

- ✓ Lesson plans are developed following the **Health Belief Model** when targeting beneficiaries in the affected areas; or
- ✓ The social cognitive theory when targeting beneficiaries visiting affected areas.
- ✓ Public campaigns that aim at massive information dissemination to raise public awareness while spreading the safety methods (MRE Golden Rule) around.

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Key Concepts of the HBM

Definition

| Perceived Susceptibility | One's belief regarding the chance of getting a condition | Define Population at risk, risk levels |
|-----------------------------|---|--|
| | | Personalize risk based on a person's characteristics or behavior |
| | | Make perceived susceptibility more consistent with an individual's actual risk |
| Perceived Severity | One's belief of how serious a condition and its squeal are | Specify consequences |
| Perceived Benefits | One's belief in the efficacy of the advised action to reduce risks or seriousness of impact | Define action to take: how, where, when; clarify the positive effects to be expected |
| Perceived Barriers | One's belief about the tangible and psychological costs of the advised action | Identify & reduce perceived barriers through reassurance, correction of misinformation, incentives, assistance |
| Cues to Action | Strategies to activate one's readiness | Provide how-to information, promote awareness, employ reminder system |
| Self-Efficacy | One's confidence in one's ability to action | Provide training, guidance in performing action |
| | | Use progressive goal setting; give verbal reinforcement |

Steps, Targets and Methods

1. Understand the Threat. 2. Plan your response. 3. Train on MRE delivery. 4. Ensure the safety of everyone involved in MRE. 5. Make your implementation Participatory. 6. Share information and make planning Participatory. 7. Monitor, evaluate, and make internal reviews.


