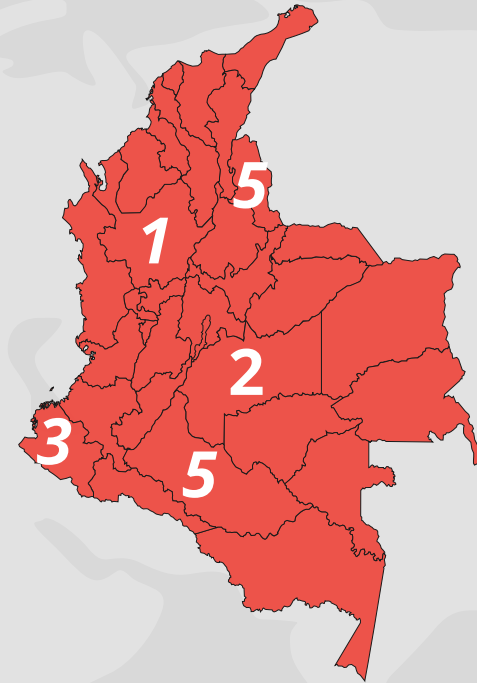

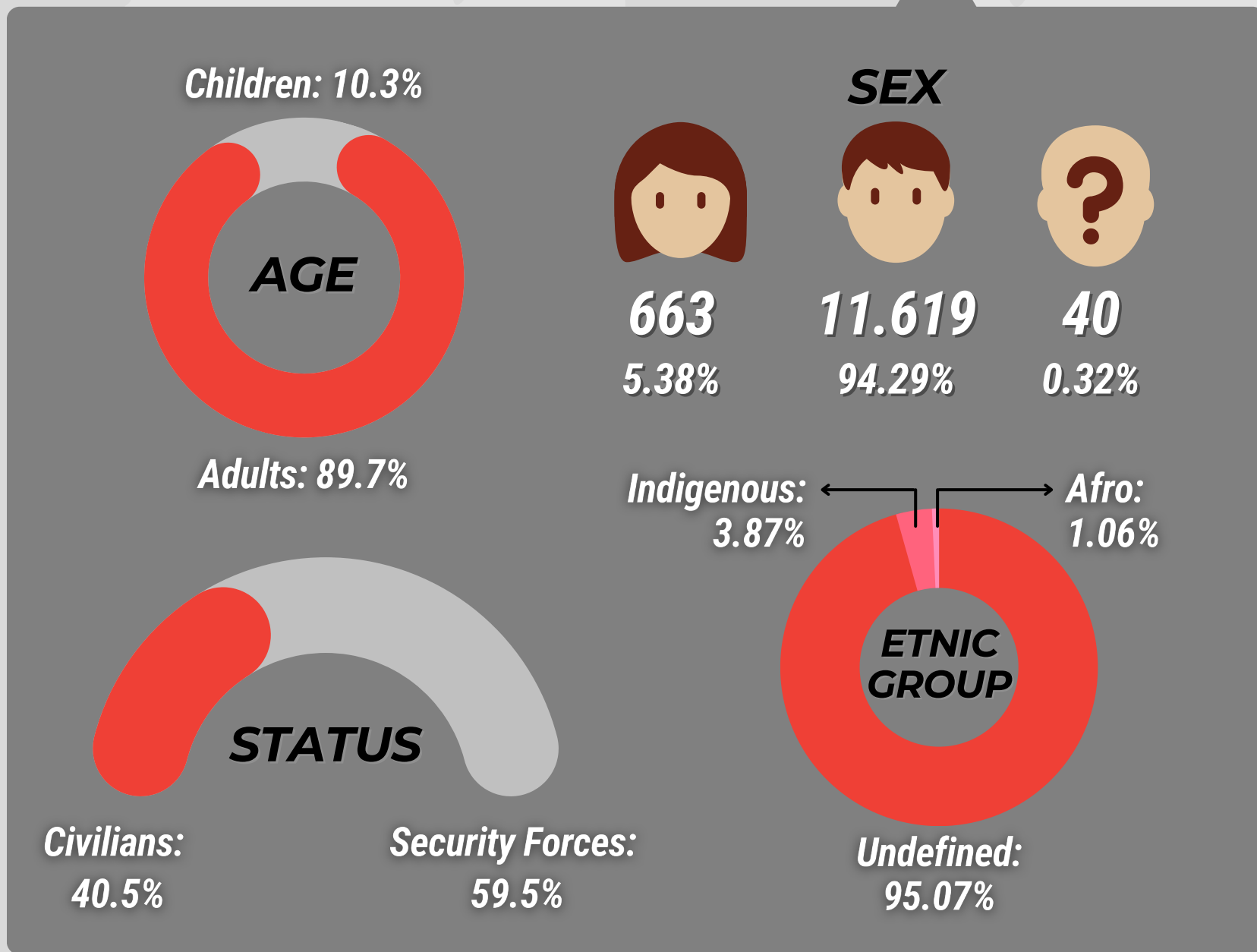

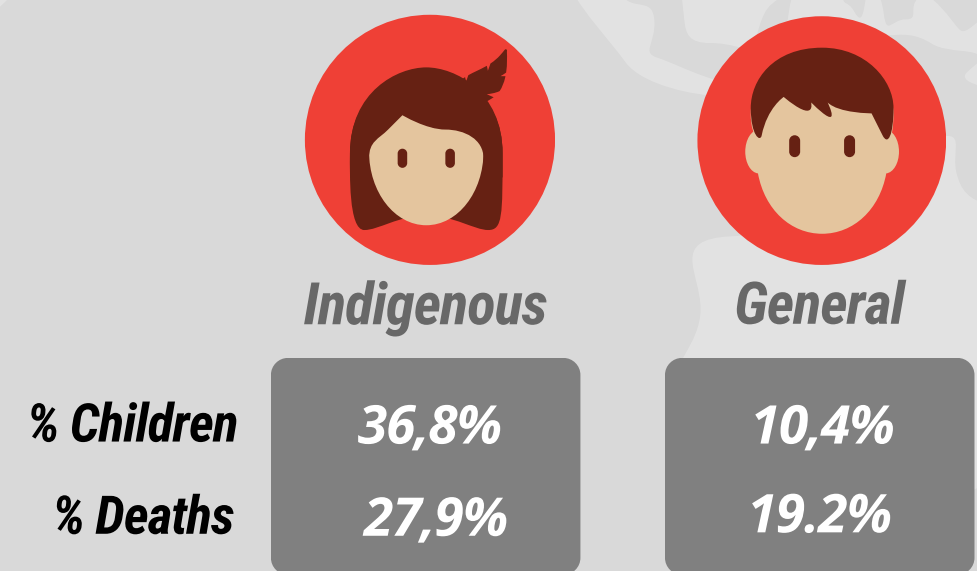

RESULTS OF UNMAS WORK IN COLOMBIA**



2,195 beneficiaries of Explosive Ordnance Risk Education (EORE) activities and assistance to 25 mine victims through Local Coordinators of UNMAS.



13 departments in Colombia included mine action tasks in their regional development plans. UNMAS staff trained 266 public officials on MA.



21 members of mine action organizations (seven women) passed the first course on Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) Level 2, organized by UNMAS.



FARC ex-combatants provided information on the possible location of more than 3.500 explosive devices installed during the conflict, with methodology of UNMAS.

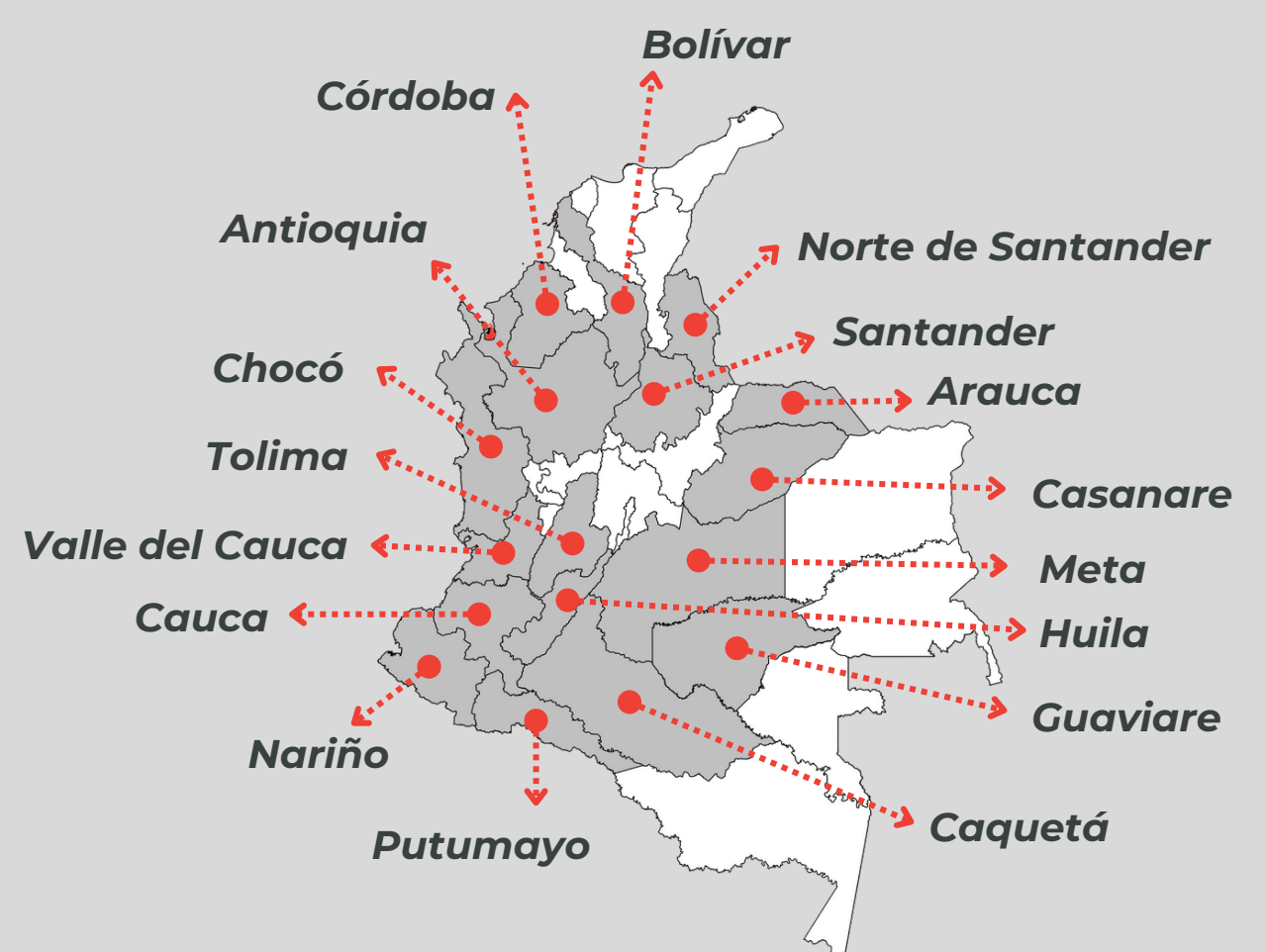


Technical Assistance to the Special Jurisdiction for Peace for the definition of a mine action project as a reparation work for the victims of the conflict in Colombia.

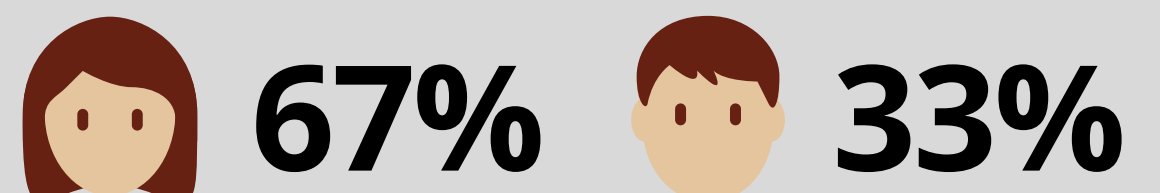

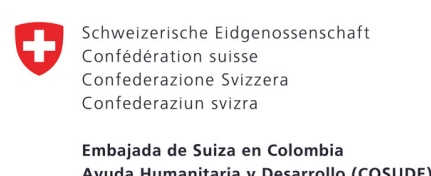
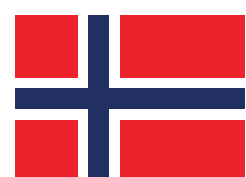
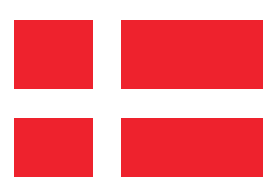
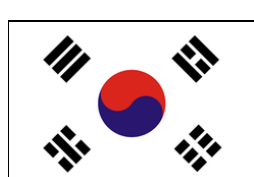


Gender parity in the UNMAS Colombia team in 2022
