A Stitch of Hope: How Tailoring Transformed Adam's Life in South Kordofan

In the heart of Al Rahmania village, South Kordofan, 26-year-old Adam Hussein's life tells a powerful story of resilience and renewal amid crisis. Displaced from his home in Abu Jubeiha by violent conflict in 2020, Adam's family faced immense hardship — losing their home, livelihood, and sense of security. For two years, they struggled to rebuild their lives in Al Rahmania, surviving on meager earnings from low-paying labor.

But a beacon of hope came when Adam was selected as one of five youth (two women and three men), to participate in a vocational training program in tailoring and embroidery. Adam received not only skills but also a sewing machine to launch his own business as part of the project, "Addressing Human Security through Integrated Support for the Most Vulnerable and Crisis-Affected Communities in South Kordofan," jointly delivered by the International Organization for Migration (IOM) and UN Mine Action Service (UNMAS).

What is Human Security?

Human security is an approach to assist Member States in identifying and addressing widespread and cross-cutting challenges to the survival, livelihood and dignity of their people." It calls for "people-centred, comprehensive, context-specific and prevention-oriented responses that strengthen the protection and empowerment of all people."

"This training changed everything," Adam reflects. "I now have a stable and dignified profession. For the first time, I can earn enough to support my family's education and healthcare needs." Beyond personal transformation, Adam's new sewing services fill a critical gap for his community, which previously had no local tailoring available.

Adam's ambition is clear: "I want to become a master tailor, open my own shop, and provide quality clothing and fabrics to my village. This is not just a livelihood—it's a foundation for hope and growth."

Adam's journey underscores how targeted, community-centered interventions can empower vulnerable populations to rebuild lives shattered by conflict. Through skills, opportunity, and dignity, small stitches weave a stronger future for individuals and communities alike.
